

Special Needs Report 29.01.18.

The inclusion, progress and attainment of children with Special Educational Needs continue, to be seen as an essential part of the teaching and learning at Broadwindsor Primary School.

SEND (Special Educational Needs and Disability) data.

There are currently 21/98 children on the SEND register at the school. This is 21.4% of the school population. This is above the 14.4% national average of pupils in schools in England in the year 2017. (7% above the national average.)

6/98 pupils currently have an EHC Plan or Statement. This is 6.1% of the school population. This is above the national average of 2.8% in England's schools (2017). (3.3% above the national average.)

15 boys have SEND= 15.3% of the school population (71.4% of the school SEND population).

6 girls have SEND= 6.1% of the school population (28.5% of the school SEND population).

15 pupils are at SEND support level. 15.3% of the school population.

6 EHCP (Educational Health Care Plan) = 6.1% of the school population.

0 EAL (English as an Additional Language) pupils = 0% of the school population.

9 FSM (Free School Meals) pupils = 9.2% of the school population.

0 service children = 0% of the school population.

1 LAC child = 1.0% of the school population.

SFR 37/2017, 27 July 2017. The number of pupils with special educational needs (SEND) has increased from 1,228,785 in January 2016 to 1,244,255 in January 2017. While this is the first annual increase since 2010, the percentage of pupils with special educational needs remains stable at 14.4%.

SEND Code of Practice 2015.

In September 2015 a new Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Act came into force. This has brought in a number of changes for all schools in the way that they plan for the inclusion of children with special educational needs and disabilities.

The SEND Code of practice requires that schools work in a way ensures that:

- Children and their parents are able to participate in decision making
- Children and needs and identified early and there is early intervention to support them
- Parents and children have greater choice and control over support
- There is collaboration between education, health and social care services to provide support
- There is high quality provision to meet the needs of children and young people with SEND
- There is a focus on inclusive practice and removing barriers to learning
- There is successful preparation for adulthood, including independent living and employment

In response to this, in 2017/2018 we have:

- Updated and reviewed annually the school SEND policy.
- Collected the views of children in EYFS, KS 1 and 2 are collected through the creation of One Page Profiles. These are updated twice yearly.
- Created a PEEP (Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan) for an SEND pupil in Year 2 which continues to be reviewed annually (October 2017).
- Continued to employ a teacher to work 1:1 and with small groups of SEND and Pupil Premium pupils (January 2016 onwards).
- The SENCo and teaching assistants work with pupils on a 1:1, 2:1 and in groups to implement interventions and provide support for SEND pupils.
- During 2017 and 2018 two more teaching assistants will have been employed to support pupils with SEND and EHC Plans.
- One further application for EHC Plans is in the process of being submitted.
- The focus for future training will be on meeting the needs of pupils socially and emotionally and the training of a member of staff as an ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant).

Identification of SEND.

How do we as a school identify SEND?

Analysing data each term to identify children who are not making expected progress or accelerated progress.

Class teachers monitor the children in class.

Adults discuss any concerns they have regarding a child at any time.

The SENCo carries out detailed assessments using recognised tests to identify pupil strengths and weaknesses.

Liaising with parents.

A discussion takes place with the relevant staff and if it is felt appropriate then the child will be added to the school's SEND register. All SEND issues are discussed with the SENCo and information is shared. Any child on the SEND register receives additional support to that which is received within the classroom through quality first teaching. Provision maps have been created for each class in the school and are costed according to the provisions provided. If it is deemed necessary, then a child may be referred to an outside agency for additional support and advice which can then be used in school to enable the child to make progress.

Parents/carers are invited to meetings with the class teacher and or the SENCo to review their child's progress, celebrate their successes and set new targets for their action plans.

Provision.

Quality first teaching (Wave 1) is used to target children's specific needs which include using detailed lesson plans with clear differentiation and the identification of any children with additional needs highlighted. Class provision maps outline additional (Wave 2 and Wave 3) provisions for individual children or groups. *For further provisions: see table below for KS1 and KS2. In most instances, these provisions are carried out by the teaching assistants who have received specific training in order to carry out the provision. If external agencies are involved, then the class teacher and teaching assistant will discuss the child's progress and review the child's action plan appropriately. After a discussion with the teaching assistants about the provisions provided in school all feedback was very positive and they felt that they were having an impact on the children's learning. The children were also very positive about the interventions such as Nessy, 1:1 support and social skills group support.

SEND funding.

The annual budget for SEND was used to buy any necessary SEND resources and training courses for teachers and teaching assistants, including the funding of four 2:1 TA's. The budget also funds any additional support in school such as reading support groups, writing support groups and the use of outside agencies. The funding of the SENCo for additional 1:1 and small group teaching hours to support SEND pupils.

The total budget for pupil premium was used for additional teaching staff hours to support children for whom progress is slower to close the gap between pupil premium children and non-pupil premium children, additional teacher hours for booster work with pupil premium children who are not making expected progress. The way in which the pupil premium budget is spent is monitored by the head teacher which outlines the interventions implemented for each child receiving pupil premium money.

Inclusion of SEND children in extracurricular activities/clubs.

All of the children in the school whether they are SEND or non-SEND are actively encouraged to join all extracurricular activities and clubs. The children have a wide variety of extracurricular activities available to them and these vary each term so that the children encounter a range of different experiences. The school encourages the SEND children to take part in a variety of different sporting events including events which are specifically organised for children who would not normally take part in team activities. This has an impact on the children's self-esteem and confidence.
